
Their care for the poor and needy had also been required of God's people in the Old Testament¹³ but was never fulfilled.

It is a place where fathers and sons can turn their hearts towards each other.






Walls are being broken down between old and young

The word "holy" means separate or "set apart," not for the purpose of being isolated but rather distinct.¹⁶

Christ said his followers would be distinguished, not by their belief system, but by two things you could see. . .

Our communities do not exist for mere idealistic purposes. Our purpose is to put an end to the cancer of selfishness that is destroying the human race. This life of sharing all things in common makes it possible to obey the otherwise unreasonable demands of scripture. Living together makes it possible to look out for the needs of others rather than our own.¹⁷ It is where we *can* put an end to selfishness since we no longer have to live for ourselves.¹⁸



This life would not be possible apart from our Messiah. If you recognize Him as the pearl of great price, this life makes it possible for you to pay the costs of the gospel. You can freely surrender all that you have for His cause: your own ideas, possessions and aspirations. You can freely give up any other cause that would hinder you from drinking the water of life. Come and see for yourself. The Spirit and the Bride say "come!" 20

It would be a place to belong, a place to be for a long time, a place where the people belong to God, and He belongs to them.
